


BROCHURE FRONT COVER:

Which Classes Should I Take?

7th-8th Grade

Be sure to take challenging classes and get good grades. The following classes are recommended during your middle school years to help you prepare for high school:

- 2 years of Language Arts
- 2 years of Math
- 1.5 years of Science
- 1.5 years of Social Studies
- 1 year of Art
- 1.5 years of Physical Education
- 1 year of Health
- 0.5 year of Career & Tech Education

In addition to taking these classes, you can prepare for college by reading at least 30 minutes beyond homework. Also, if you find yourself struggling in classes, ask for help from your teachers. They want you to succeed!

9th-12th Grade

It might seem like a long way away, but the classes you choose in high school can impact how successful you are in college.

The following classes are recommended in grades 9-12:

- Four years of English: Courses that emphasize expository and analytic writing skills and grammar are recommended.
- Four years of Math: Proficiency in Algebra, Geometry, and Algebra II. For those students planning to pursue majors in science, technology, math, and engineering, pre-calculus or calculus is strongly encouraged.
- Three years of Science: Courses should include Physical Science, Biology, Chemistry, or Physics. Lab experiences are preferable.
- Three years of Social Studies: Courses should include U.S. History, World History, Geography, Economics, and Government to build cultural and global awareness.
- Directive Coursework: Should include at least one and a half credits of Fine Arts and one credit of CTE. Foreign Language is encouraged.
- Coursework through your Senior Year: Meaningful course work in the senior year, especially in English, math, and science, is essential in helping students perform successfully in the first year of college.

Keeping a 3.0 grade point average in these classes can really help too. You can also ask your counselor about CTE courses, concurrent enrollment, AP and IB courses, to help make transitioning to college even easier.



PAYING FOR COLLEGE

College is an investment that pays off. It is preparation for a career. The long-term benefits of a college education drastically outweigh the cost of initially going.

Don't assume you can't afford to go to college. There are many financial aid resources available to help you pay for it. This assistance is generally in one of the following four types of financial aid:

GRANTS: Federal/state money given to those who qualify based upon financial need

SCHOLARSHIPS: Money given for education no need for repayment

WORK STUDY: Money given to a qualified individual in exchange for work

LOANS: Money loaned at a favorable rate, but must be repaid.
